In Germany, decorated eggs are hung on branches of bushes and trees to make them Easter egg trees. Eggs also used to dress wells for Easter, the Osterbrunnen, most prominently in the Frankische Schweiz (Franconian Switzerland).

In Croatia and Slovenia, a basket of food is prepared and covered with a handmade cloth, and brought to the church to be blessed. A typical Easter basket includes bread, colored eggs, ham, horseradish, and a type of nut cake called "potica".

The butter lamb (Baranek wielkanocny) is a traditional addition to the Easter meal for many Polish Catholics. Butter is shaped into a lamb either by hand or in a lamb-shaped mould.

In Hungary, Transylvania, Southern Slovakia, Kárpátalja, Northern Serbia - Vojvodina and other territories with Hungarian-speaking communities, the day following Easter is called Locsoló Hétfő, "Watering Monday". Water, perfume or perfumed water is often sprinkled in exchange for an Easter egg.

MISSIONARY NEWS:

Dear prayer team,

Wow, it has been so cool to see how God has been working lately. Last week my friend Catherine and I were able to have dinner with 2 students who graduated last year and share with them about Jesus and the Bible. They had so many questions and were really soaking it all in. We read from John 1 and spent some time talking about why Jesus needed to come to Earth and who he was. It was really a special time and a great opportunity to plant some seeds which I know God wants to grow in them.

Also, I have really enjoyed my friendships with Hungarians, meeting new people, and explaining why I'm here. Not only this but God has blessed me with opportunities to enjoy myself at the same time. I got to go hiking in the Tatra Mountains one weekend, and went to a traditional Hungarian festival the next. So cool!

Thank you for your earnest prayers for my ministry. I also have a large request. March 15 is our deadline for deciding whether to stay another year. As this difficult time approaches I feel more and more as though God is calling me to move on in my ministry and to grow as a teacher. There are many things I want to learn about teaching, I want to have experience in an American classroom, teach History, get my Master's, etc. This is such a difficult decision because I love Hungary so much, my students, my job...but I feel as if God is wanting to stretch my faith, to give up what is familiar and comfortable (again), and trust him through my fears. There are many fears I have about this decision: culture shock in America, finding a job/car/etc, leaving my friends and community here, lost ministry, and opportunities, relearning how to do things/routine, leaving my students, wanting to be in missions/ overseas again in the future, will people support me again in future missions, and so much more. The thought of leaving makes me want to cry and quite honestly gives me some anxiety. It will be one of the hardest things I will have had to do yet. Please pray for me during this time. Pray for confirmation, open doors, provision (for the support I need to finish here and for "starting over" if I return), and that I finish strong here in Hungary. 

Calvary

Jesus Čhrist, 33 of Nazareth died Friday on Mount Calvary also known as Golgotha, the place of Betrayal by the apostle Judas. Jesus was crucified by the Romans, by the ruler Pontius Pilate. The causes of death were crucifixion, extreme exhaustion, severe torture, and loss of blood.

Jesus Christ, was a descendent of Abraham, was a member of the house of David. He was son of the late Joseph, a carpenter of Nazareth, and Mary, his devoted Mother.. Jesus was born in a stable in the city of Bethlehem, Judea. He is survived by his mother Mary, his faithful Apostles, numerous disciples and many other followers.

Jesus was a self-educated and spent most of his adult life working as a Teacher. Jesus also occasionally worked as a Medical Doctor and it is reported that he healed many patients. Up until his death, Jesus, Jesus was teaching and sharing the Good News, healing the sick, touching the lonely, feeding the hungry and helping the poor.

Jesus was most noted for telling parables about his Father's Kingdom and performing miracles, such as feeding over 5000 people with only five loaves and two fish; and healing a man who was born blind. On the day before his death he held a Last Supper celebrating the Passover Feast, at which he foretold his death.

The body was quickly buried in a stone grave, which was donated by Joseph of Arimethea, a loyal friend of the family. By order of the Pontius Pilate, a boulder was place in front of the tomb. Roman soldiers were put on guard.

In lieu of flowers, the family has requested that everyone try to live as Jesus did. Donations may be sent to anyone in need.

Origin of April Fools Day

Precursors of April Fools' Day include the Roman festival of <u>Hilaria</u>, held March 25, and the Medieval <u>Feast of Fools</u>, held December 28, still a day on which pranks are played in Spanish-speaking countries.

In Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales* (1392), the "Nun's Priest's Tale" is set *Syn March bigan thritty dayes and two*. Modern scholars believe that there is a copying error in the extant manuscripts and that Chaucer actually wrote, *Syn March was gon*. Thus, the passage originally meant 32 days after April, i.e. May 2, the anniversary of the engagement of King Richard II of England to Anne of Bohemia, which took place in 1381. Readers apparently misunderstood this line to mean "March 32", i.e. April 1. In Chaucer's tale, the vain cock Chauntecleer is tricked by a fox.

In 1508, French poet <u>Eloy d'Amerval</u> referred to a *poisson d'avril* (April fool, literally "April fish"), a possible <u>reference</u> to the holiday. In 1539, Flemish poet Eduard de Dene wrote of a nobleman who sent his servants on foolish errands on April 1. In 1686, <u>John Aubrey</u> referred to the holiday as "Fooles holy day", the first British reference. On April 1, 1698, several <u>people</u> were tricked into going to the <u>Tower of London</u> to "see the Lions washed".

In the Middle Ages, up until the late 18th century, New Year's Day was celebrated on March 25 (<u>Feast of the Annunciation</u>) in most European towns. In some areas of France, New Year's was a week-long holiday ending on April 1. Many writers suggest that April Fools originated because those who celebrated on January 1 made <u>fun</u> of those who celebrated on other dates. The use of January 1 as New Year's Day was common in France by the mid-16th century, and this date was adopted officially in 1564 by the <u>Edict of Roussillon</u>.
